

**The President's Message**

Members of Arizona Predator Callers,

This President's Message will cover some club business that needs several avenues of distribution to get to everyone. First order of business is to remind everyone that our **Hunt Records are due by next month's meeting**. Those that turn their hunt record in by the end of April's meeting will be in a drawing for one of three Coyote Rage DVDs. To turn in a hunt record just pick one up at the meeting, fill it out, and hand it to any of the board members present at the meeting. Some misconceptions APC members have about hunt records-

1. **"I didn't shoot hardly anything (or nothing at all) so my hunt record is not needed."** **FALSE.** We contact every single member to get a hunt record. 90% of the members shoot nothing at all. It's no big deal. Just fill out a record and put zero in the total.
2. **"Other hunters are going to look at the hunting unit I put down on my hunt records and know my secret hunting locations."** **FALSE.** If you put area 37B you need to remember that unit is HUGE. Literally hundreds of square miles. Talking to others about where you go or actually taking them there is how honey holes get stolen.
3. **"Hunting records are unimportant in the grand scheme of things."** **FALSE.** Arizona Game & Fish requests our hunt records yearly to use in annual wildlife reports. Our club's hunt records are one of the ONLY verifiable means of getting accurate wildlife population totals. Accurate numbers are important. Unit numbers are important. Your participation is very important.

If you fail to turn in a hunt record plan on being called at home. Dusty or one of the other board members will take your hunt tally over the phone. this is how important this is to us, and AZ G&F. Please make this as easy as possible for us. Secondly, hunt records are how we verify who is the Arizona Caller of the Year. We require a properly filled out hunt record for all participants who wish to submit their totals for consideration in the yearly contest. All areas of the hunt record need to be filled out properly. Failure to do this step will disqualify you in the contest.

The APC board members met and decided to continue our tradition of awarding the winners of each category a gift certificate to **AJI Sporting Goods** in Apache Junction, AZ. Each award has specific rules.

1. **Top Caller of the Year- \$150 gift certificate.** This member has the most total points for called in and shot predators of all members in the club. Predators that qualify are the following: Lion, bear, coyote, bobcat, fox, and badger. Point values are listed on the hunt record. A member may also record points for pictures of live

2. **Top Youth Caller of the Year- \$100 gift certificate.** This is a youth hunter age 12 to 17 that has the most total points for called in and shot predators of all other youth in the club.

3. **Mentor of the Year- \$100 gift certificate.** This is awarded to the experienced caller who takes out the most individual novices throughout the year.

4. **Top Fur Salesman of the Year- \$100 gift certificate.** This is awarded to the individual who has the highest fur check at the Arizona Trappers Association Fur Auction in February. A copy of your fur check or receipt is proof.

Generally we do not award the same individual the same award more than once to give others a chance to win. The APC Board of Directors has the final say in judgement matters and has a proven track record of being fair.

Here is what an \$850.00 Bobcat looks like. Top dollar cat was \$1,000. There were several between \$700 and \$1,000. Big cats, put up right = big money this year.



We had 388 bobcat sell in the auction. Eight of those sold for \$800 or higher, with a high of \$1000. There were seventeen that sold between \$600 and \$800, 73 that sold between \$400 and \$600, with a total average of \$334 for all bobcats sold. The coyotes sold for \$36 average and the high was \$80. Total coyotes sold was 186 and 67 of them were \$35 and up. There was one lot of 10 coyotes that sold for \$650. Well fured coyotes that were cleaned, holes were sewn, fleshed, and that were put up right brought the most money. There is still alot of coyotes not even fleshed in the auction. We had 29 coyotes that sold for five dollars. Most of those could of brought alot more money for the sellers. We also had six lots of coyotes that did not even get a bid, not sure why. Foxes were an average of \$19. Most foxes sold for \$20, the high was \$27. Not alot of interest in foxes, one buyer bought them all. We had a great auction this year. Try to do a better job putting up the furs and hope for the prices to be even higher next year. So go out next year and harvest some more fur.

## Novice Hunt Reports

**Scott Hornaday** and I hunted the White Canyon Wilderness during the October Novice hunt and successfully harvested no predators. We did see quail and bunnies but no fur bearing predators. The October heat got to us a 2:00PM and we called it a day and missed the check in.

**Cory Johnson** and I hunted the White Canyon Wilderness and Griffin Ranch during the November Novice hunt and successfully harvested no predators. We did not see any fur bearing predators.

Hunter safety is always an important aspect of every hunt and it is the little details that can lead to serious trouble. I use the **Porath Dazed Dog Coyote mist** on some stands and always keep the bottle doubled plastic bagged in the bed of the truck to avoid contamination. The bottle cover vibrated loose in Cory's truck bed and I did not notice the problem while walking to the next stand until I tipped the bottle and I am sorry to report that the substance contaminated my left hand. Every time I called with my left I was reminded of the importance of little details that keep hunters safe.

When we ended that stand I was fearful that Cory would not let my left hand ride inside his new truck. Fortunately, I was prepared for this emergency with a [Wet Ones® | Antibacterial Hand Wipes](#) that removed the offensive odor and saved our hunt from a tragic ending. We hunted all day, but also missed the hunt check in as Cory's young daughter had a fever and he needed to get home.

My brother **Paul** had a similar loose cover hunting incident that involved Doe in Heat lure. Paul has no sense of smell due to a motorcycle accident and he did not notice that the entire contents of the Doe in Heat lure drained into his coat pocket. He thought he could hear deer from his tree stand but never could see any deer.

At the end of the day he hiked out to the trail where he could see our nephew **Terry** intently hunting off to the right. He turned to the left to hike back to camp and then he heard the report from Terry's rifle. Terry shot the buck that was following Paul looking for the doe in heat but carefully staying out of Paul's view.

## Especially for Youth by Dan Rooney

Way too many years ago, at the age of 15, my high school football coach and Predator Calling Hall of Famer, Reed Peterson, introduced me to the sport of "varmint" calling. He would have us over to his house on Saturday morning to review the previous night's game films and then pull out his Circe Calls and teach us the Too Wah, Too Wah, of the cottontail and the coarser mimic sound of the jackrabbit. One special Saturday he had over the colorful, inventor of the Circe Call, Bill Dudley. I still remember Bill's profound words, "Once you call in your first coyote, you've become an expert. If you kill it, you've become a master." By "Dudley Definition," I became an expert and master on my very first trip out behind the old GM Proving Grounds. Within one minute, a coyote came in head on, and did an immediate about face. The shot from my new Parker Hale .270 was effective but not pretty. With the newly discovered aroma, I had one in the truck!

2500 coyotes, 33 bears, several lions, numerous foxes and countless "skunks," and that's "skunked" not skunks, my favorite activity and most memorable moments has been taking our youth and introducing them to the sport of calling. At the ages of 12, I first took my two nephews calling. 30 years later, both being very successful professionals, still anxiously await our annual "Roon Dog Hunt." The numbers, including my sons and son's n laws, has increased to 25+ with some of the best fireside trash talking and highly competitive competition. It took 25 years to dethrone Dad and Uncle Dan, but that is only because, that year, they stole all of my ammunition while I was asleep.

Both of my sons are avid callers, who I would put up against anyone. They detest electronic calls and call it "fake" or "woosie" calling. I too do not like electronic calls, but will admit that when hunting alone, my kill ratio is greater with an electronic call, although I believe I am 50/50 on response with mouth and electronic. My youngest son Chase is a dead-eye shot with his older brother Gavin being a "combo" killer. He shoots, always wounding and then finishing with some sort of blunt instrument. Dad can still tack drive them with his Bushmaster.

The greatest gift my children have given is 18 grandchildren, 6 boys and 12 girls. This past Christmas vacation was my most memorable calling trip. With Gavin the "Combo Killer," his two daughters, **Kennedy** age 8 and **Rivers** age 6, accompanied us on a two day calling trip on the Navajo Reservation. Logistically, it is a bit more complex, requires more detailed planning with lectures from Mom and both Grandmas, when taking young girls on "killing" trips, as described by those dear ladies.

Day 1 was pretty disheartening with high winds and a significant drop in temperature. In route to the Navajo, I tried one of my sure areas, but didn't remember the elk hunt was in full swing in Unit 4. Dang, elk hunters become anti-yote busters! We dropped down onto the flats for our evening hunt and to one of my sure thing areas as I described to Kennedy. As we set up, I placed Gavin and Rivers about 60 yards to my right and had Kennedy sit snuggled beside me. I quietly

explained to Kennedy that I put her Dad to the right of me, because the coyotes usually will come in from the left of us. It's a left thing! 30 seconds into my calling, Kennedy tugged on my sleeve and pointing to her left said, "Pappa there's one coming in." I glanced and saw a yote coming full speed directly at us. My first thought was to let him come to where he might circle out so Gavin and Rivers would see and have a shot, but that was only a brief moment of indiscretion, as the yote tumbled end over end from the head shot of my Bushmaster. With one in the truck, the sun set on Day 1.



Some traditions should never be broken, with one of those traditions being eating gut-churning Mexican food in Winslow, staying in the same Route 66 dive of a hotel and still paying \$18.00 per night after 30 years and munching on Hostess Cinni-cakes and chocolate cupcakes.

Day 2 started at 5:00 a.m. with both girls awake and ready to go. It is amazing how cute little girls are in Kings Ranch Camo.



Especially for Youth continued:

We drove about an hour after breakfast at Denny's, arriving at another for sure area about 15 minutes before daylight. Gavin was going to do the calling with Rivers at his side. Having one in the truck, I had Gavin and Rivers sit down hill from Kennedy and I, knowing that if a coyote responded, it would come in down-hill and...to the left. Gavin started with a locator howl, waited about 3 minutes and let out a second howl. Off in the distance several coyotes responded. I quietly told Kennedy her Dad was going to call those yotes in. Gavin then went into his first jackrabbit series. Gavin has one of the most authentic and effective calls of any I know. 40 seconds into his call, I spotted two coyotes coming off the hillside, heading straight to his calling, followed by a blast from his .243 McMillan and that familiar "thunk" of the projectile hitting its mark. I immediately went into a Ki-Ki, and coaxing followed with an injured pup cry, then...Boom...a second shot from Gavins .243 and that second "thunk." Two more in the truck...and with only one combo kill!

We both had to be home early, so we made only two more non-productive stands. Another of our traditions over 30 years both on coyote calling trips and deer hunts on the Kaibab has been shooting eggs. I had brought my Marlin lever-action .22 mag and 3 dozen eggs. The girls had a blast and did amazingly well shooting eggs at 25, 50, 75 and 100 yards.

Ten minutes into the drive home, two little girls were fast asleep, in their Kings Ranch Camo with smiles on their little faces and a proud Father and Grandfather in the front with really big smiles on their whiskered faces.

Take a youth with you on future calling trips. Introduce them to the sport and the wonderments of the outdoors. You may not put many in the back of the truck, but you still will be filled with "Expert and Masterful" experiences.

## APC Meeting February 9, 2012

Toggle switches mounted on breadboard on the underneath side within reach of your trigger finger.



The basic unit is made from **two large juice cans** with the ends removed and a **third can that has been cut in half**.

The **GE #4509 white lamp** and the **Wagner #4415A amber lamp** are mounted between the can tubes and the base can halves. Black tape and black sealer is used to hold the unit together and black out any light at the seams.

**Breadboard** purchased from Radio Shack is used as a lightweight frame to bind the two cans together side by side.

A **handgrip from a packaging tape dispenser** is used and a **spring loaded toggle switch** activates the lights.

Dusty uses a **35 amp hour sealed lead acid battery** carried in a backpack to power the system, purchased from Batteries Plus.

**Field Tips:** Hunt with a partner. Take turns being the shooter or spotter. Sweep the area, not too slowly, using the amber light, turned at a slight angle. Look for the reflected eyes. When spotted, Turn the light 90 degrees to alert the shooter that there is a critter. When the shooter is ready, he says "Burn Him" and the light spotter puts the white light on the critter. If it is a coyote, the shooter fires. Don't forget to watch what is in the background. Don't call too loud at night.
