The President's Message

by John Arterburn, APC President



Jim O'Dell and I recently attended the South Eastern Arizona Coyote Calling Challenge in southern Arizona. The activity took place over a weekend with the final check-in in Safford. We hunted over a day and a half.

Prior to the hunt Jim and I were scouting in an area we planned to hunt with good response. What we could not control was the wind we were going to experience in our hunting area. The day of the hunt we had very strong winds. Winds so strong the coyotes were in bedding areas. We spent the day calling areas where Jim had received responses, with no takers except one.

Jim was calling and I was watching the downwind. We were in heavy cover so the coyote and a great deal of cover to use. Jim had called one that was coming to the call then making its way down wind to confirm what it was hearing. Jim's hope was I would pick up, I never did.

The day ended, nightfall had come and it was time to go to work scouting a new area. Jim chose our next hunt area as it would give us a few hours to hunt and make the check-in in time. We spent the night calling in the new area and recording responses. Once we had covered the area we went to sleep in the truck.

The next morning we determined the wind direction so we could hunt into the wind or into a crosswind at all the spots we had coyotes respond the night before. Jim had hunted this area before and knew where we were. I had not hunted this area so I had no idea where we were from the big picture perspective.

The area was a mixture of tight cover and wide-open spaces. In some cases this posed a problem for me as to whether to take rifle or shotgun. I made the major mistake of taking a new gas operated shotgun with a full choke rather than my tried and true pump with a turkey choke and red-dot scope.

In three different areas we went into we called four of the coyotes we had heard the night before. Jim was watching the downwind as I called. At some point in the calling sequence I spot a coyote upwind on a ridge starting to make it's way downwind. I loose track of it and a few minutes later I hear a shot. Jim harvested one with his shotgun.

On two more stands I am calling and we have coyotes come in. We are setup on a crosswind in both stands. In one case I see it going away between our two positions and shoot, to no avail. In another stand I am calling and we are about 20 minutes into the stand. I signal to end the stand but Jim does not respond. I signal a few more times with no response. I finally turn toward Jim and the down wind and there is a coyote on a ridge making its way upwind. It sees me and starts to move away, so I laydown shotgun rounds to no avail again.

At this point it is time to head for the check-in. Four maybe five called in but only one harvested. On the way to check-in Jim is driving and I am sleeping when the coyote alert goes off. Jim spots a coyote crossing the road. Out of my sound sleep I am on the ground after this coyote. The first standing shot is a miss. Off I go after the coyote that runs maybe 100 yards and stops to survey the situation and me. Second standing shot is a harvest. Now while this is going on Jim sees a coyote moving across country and thinks I missed a second time.

I get back to the truck and we compare notes and realize it was two coyotes, so we head down the road for a last stand. We find a place to turn off and go in to make a

Thanksgiving Elk Hunt

I managed to go on my deer hunt in Alaska and suffered through a torn up knee only to have surgery at the end of September. The Alaska trip was my only hunt this fall. I have been laid up and going stir crazy to get out.

My buddy asked me to come help him on his late season bull elk hunt so he wouldn't have to hunt by himself. I drove up to his cabin on Thanksgiving afternoon and got settled in. The weather was wonderful and we were looking forward to a great time.

Friday morning we left the cabin and found we were in for a very cold morning. After such a warm fall in the Phoenix area, the 14 degrees we headed out into seemed down-right frigid. Elk love cold weather so I had to smile in spite of my cold hands. I had only been off my crutches for a little over a week and had to hobble out to our glassing point. The morning started off good- three elk walked up to us and surrendered! The cows walked to within 15 feet of where we were silently glassing- too bad it was not an antlerless hunt!



I glassed a good sized bunch of elk feeding along a fence line but there were none sporting any headgear. I found a few mule deer including a nice 4x4 rutting his does. A coyote sounded off in the distance but nobody paid him any attention.

I decided to move to a canyon that I knew to hold elk when they get pressured. We set up and started glassing. I was really hoping that some other hunters would come bird-dog this canyon so we wouldn't have to. Pretty soon I spotted a pair of older hunters on the far side of the canyon. A few minutes later another pair- apparently a father and son appeared a little further down the canyon. I was feeling pretty good about our choice of glassing spot. Before long I spotted yet another pair of hunters working their way down into the canyon. The father and son team started hurling rocks into the steep draw. I just knew this was going to be our day.

Within a minute a herd of elk appeared trotting straight towards us- they might as well been carrying a big white flag as their path would bring them right into our laps. The only bull in the bunch was a spike and Gary didn't want to shoot a spike this year. We let them waltz right past us. Day one was over.

Saturday morning was cloudy and much, much warmer. We headed into the cedar area of the unit to find the bulls heading away from the pressure. We crept along trying to get to our pre-determined vantage point when we spotted a pair of bulls trying to sneak away. We ran to the only tree around- an old dead snag of a cedar tree to use as a shooting rest. One bull turned broadside and Gary touched off a shot. We both heard the bullet hit but he did not know how good the shot was. The bulls disappeared into the cedars on the far side of the clearing about 400 yards away.

We made our way over to where we last saw them. After a 30 minute search, I picked up their tracks and started after the bulls. The tracks split up and I found one small drop of what I hoped was blood. I rubbed the sandy blob between my fingers and extracted a little red out of it. Yep, it was blood. This was the confirmation that we needed to pick up the chase. I followed the hurried tracks into the trees and found where he holed up once reaching cover. The tracks in the sandy soil told a story- a story that showed him watching his back track



and trying to sort out what to do. A large splash of blood confirmed this was the correct bull to follow. Off we started again. There was no more blood. The tracks led to an elk trail where his tracks were blended in with several making it impossible to determine which was which. I could occasionally get a whiff of the bull as we were tracking into the wind. I started zigzagging into the wind and after about an hour, cut a fresh set of bull tracks, the heavy imprint of the dewclaws was very obvious. I followed them to see if there was any blood. After about 1/4 mile I found a fresh blood clot next to the tracks- game on. I was not sure that the bull was scared and cutting directly into the wind. He was apparently more concerned about what was ahead than what was behind. This allowed me to follow him with my nose as well as his tracks. When I felt we were getting close we slowed down and found him bedded just up ahead. Gary made a shot but the bull managed get to his feet. The thick cedar trees have a way of eating up bullets! Another couple of shots and the bull made a death dash. We heard a loud crash and found the bull had run headlong into a cedar tree. The 5x5 rack was tangled up in the branches and we were glad to have a small folding saw along to cut the branches out of our way.

We were a mile from the truck and I had one very sore knee! This was the third bull that I had tracked down in the last two seasons. Many guys will give up but perseverance is virtue when it comes to tracking. Knowing a little about the way they react and paying attention to details will normally let you catch up with the wounded animal. It is much easier with two people to track as one can sort out the sign while one scans ahead.

Gary was very excited to have bagged his first branch-antlered bull elk. I knew we would get a lot of good meat out of it too. The late season elk hunts are among my favorite hunts. The cold weather, the predictable nature of the elk and the separation of the cows and bulls all make for an incredible hunt. Now that the elk hunts are over, it's time to concentrate on coyotes!

TWO FOX PROJECTS THAT NEED YOUR HELP

The USDA National Rabies Management Program (NRMP) is conducting a gray fox ecology study in the Southwestern Region of the United States. USDA is collecting tissue samples to determine the interactions and distribution of the gray fox. USDA can then correlate habitat and distribution for the rabies program to work toward elimination of rabies in the gray fox species. USDA is also looking at ectoparasites for disease monitoring and research. For our study we are asking for the collection of the GPS coordinates, the head, and ticks found and removed from the body. If you are willing to participate please contact Valerie Burton or Lola Van Pelt at (602) 870-2081. USDA will provide sampling kits and instructions. Your assistance is greatly appreciated!

AND

A graduate student at the University of Arizona, Amanda Veals, is studying gray fox ecology in Arizona. She attached GPS radio collars to 16 adult foxes in the Graham Mountains (Safford, AZ) and White Mountains (Alpine, AZ) to study how the foxes use the landscape and what kind of habitat they prefer. She has been collecting data from these collars, but the batteries are starting to die on the collars. Amanda needs help recovering these collars; that's where you come in!

We ask that, if you harvest a fox this season that is wearing a collar, contact Amanda to return the collar. These foxes were collared in the following game management units: 1, 27, 28, and 31. It is legal to harvest a collared fox and we emphasize that there is no penalty to catching a collared fox. As long as the fox was harvested legally you may keep the fox. We just ask that you return the collar to Amanda when found. For any collar returned, Amanda will offer a \$100 reward.

These radio collars store extremely valuable data that we can only access if the collars are returned. We greatly appreciate any help you can provide for Amanda's project.

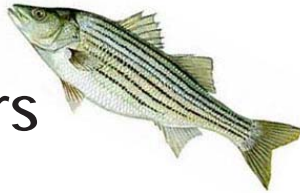

2017 spring draw results available for Portal account holders

Don't have a free account? Sign up now!

PHOENIX – Hunters who have an AZGFD Customer Portal account now can view their draw results for the 2017 spring turkey, javelina, bison and bear seasons. Simply log into your account, and you will be taken to your personal ‘My AZ Outdoors’ page.

Portal account holders have the benefit of being able to view their draw results a day or two before the results officially are released. It's quick, easy and free to create a

Portal account. Just click on the “Sign in to Account” button in the upper right-hand corner of the www.azgfd.gov home page and then select the “Create an Account” option, filling in the requested information. Portal accounts are mobile-friendly, so customers can view their information on their smartphones.

Meanwhile, the department will post an announcement on its website when results officially are released. All permit-tags are anticipated to be mailed by Dec. 14; all refund warrants by Nov. 30.

Governor Ducey reappoints Kurt Davis to Arizona Game and Fish Commission

PHOENIX — Governor Doug Ducey today announced the reappointment of Kurt Davis as a member of the Arizona Game and Fish Commission.

Davis is currently finishing a five-year term that began after his appointment in 2011 by then-Governor Jan Brewer. He served as commission chair in fiscal year 2016 and was one of three candidates forwarded earlier this month by the Arizona Game and Fish Commission Appointment Recommendation Board for Governor Ducey's consideration.

“Kurt has admirably served the commission, Arizona's wildlife and the people of Arizona,” said Governor Ducey. “He is well versed in wildlife and outdoor recreation issues and is a strong advocate for the state's wildlife management authorities. His extensive experience in government, communications and business will continue to be a tremendous asset.”

“Serving on a commission dedicated to conserving and protecting Arizona's wildlife—more than 800

species—is an honor of a lifetime,” said Commissioner Davis. “I look forward to continuing help set policy for the nation's premier wildlife agency and representing our constituents.”

An avid hunter and angler, Davis is a founding partner at FirstStrategic, a communications and public affairs firm specializing in strategic public policy development for non-profit clients, issues relating to rural Arizona, and government relations. Prior to forming FirstStrategic, Davis served as vice president of public affairs and marketing at Northern Arizona University and before that was vice president of public affairs and corporate communications at Rural/Metro Corporation.

Davis previously served as a deputy chief of staff and executive assistant in the office of former Arizona Governor Fife Symington. In that role, he had policy responsibility for executive agencies such as the departments of transportation, corrections, state land, game and fish, and others. He has also served as director of intergovernmental affairs and issues analysis at the Arizona Attorney General's Office, and executive director of the Arizona Republican Party.

Davis was appointed to several positions in the Reagan administration and served as a gubernatorial appointment to the Arizona Board of Regents, the Vision 21 Transportation Task Force, and the Arizona State Board for Charter Schools. He received a Bachelor of Science from Northern Arizona University in 1984.

He is active in the community and has served on the boards of directors of Great Hearts Academies, the Arizona Chamber of Commerce, and Arizona State University's Ramsey Executive Program for Public Policy.

Davis's reappointment for a five-year term awaits confirmation by the Arizona Senate.

The Arizona Game and Fish Commission is a five-member board that sets policy, appoints the Arizona Game and Fish Department director and oversees the department. The commission establishes rules and regulations for managing and conserving wildlife and fisheries resources, and for safe and regulated watercraft and off-highway vehicle (OHV) operations for the benefit of Arizona residents. Commission members are appointed by the governor with the assistance of the Game and Fish Commission Appointment Recommendation Board and are confirmed by the Senate.
